Winter is Coming!

The snow will be starting to fly soon, and there are some tips to consider.

First off, keep your septic tank covers covered. In other words don't shovel the snow off them. I read somewhere that the lids should be cleared so that gases escape. Well don't believe everything you read on the internet. Two years ago, it was so cold that the water in one of the floats that moves up and down with the level of you know what the tank, froze solid. This caused the alarm to go off as the tank sensors were indicating the tank was too full. Try heading out at 2:00am in sub-zero weather to turn off the alarm before it wakes everyone, and hitting the switch to do a manual flush, just to repeat it again the next time someone got up in the middle of the night to flush!

Well that was a fun winter!

Secondly, keep your decks and balconies shovelled. I have heard some stories of the snow being so heavy on a wood deck, that the deck started to come off the side of the house.

Thirdly, if you are thinking of doing some tree clearing, get approval from the GHPA first and then consider keeping trees that are blocking your north-west view of the lake. That is where the predominant winds (and thus most of your snow) come from.

Fourthly, mice like to come in doors in the winter for warmth, so wander around the outside of the house and check for any holes where they might enter. They only need a hole about the size of a dime (for an adult mouse), or the size of pen for an adolescent (it's the skull size that is the limitation). One common entry point is from the crawl space up through the pipe hole for the kitchen sink so block it with steel wool.


Finally if you are having your driveway plowed by Murv Myles:

- He will also clear an area around garbage bins, so garbage can be picked up

Remember that Murv is also doing the municipality, so don't expect an immediate response on heavy snow days.

Make sure you mark your rocks or other large obstacles so Murv doesn't damage his blades. See a picture below as an example.



Smart Thermostats for your Cottage

Along the same line as the previous topic of Winter is Coming, a smart option to have in your cottage is a smart thermostat. That way you can keep the temperature low during the winter when you are not there to save on propane, but turn up the heat remotely over a Wi-Fi connection on the way up, so the cottage is nice and toasty when you arrive.



There are a number of smart thermostats on the market, the two most popular being Nest and Ecobee. You can watch the YouTube video below for a good comparison between the two:



I have an original Ecobee at Greenough and love it, and recently installed one for free at my home in Mississauga through something called the Green Ontario Fund https://www.greenon.ca/en/programs/greenon-installations. I am a bit of a geek and follow Ecobee on LinkedIn, so found the offer very early in the game. My installer said they have installations booked into the spring of 2019 already so there may be a wait!

The latest Ecobee, Ecobee4 is now available in Canada and comes with Alexa from Amazon built in with speakers included. You can now just tell your thermostat to turn down for the night, and by the way play some soft jazz too. Nest has a nice learning feature to set a schedule for the thermostat based on your habits which is also a nice feature.

I myself like Ecobee as it's a Canadian company based in Toronto and has remote sensors that can be used to set the thermostat based on the room with the sensor, not based on where the thermostat is located.
